Court reporters are often told the answer to success is more briefs, more complexity, and more practice. But history and science tell a different story. In 1953, the Cohen twins achieved 99.789% accuracy at speeds up to 280 wpm on manual machines. Many court reporters find themselves frustrated by repeated attempts to work with scopists that don't quite work out. Files come back needing extensive cleanup, expectations feel misaligned, and the time and financial investment can feel wasted. As a result, some reporters abandon the idea of working with a scopist altogether, often at the expense of their own time, health, and long-term sustainability.

This session reframes the problem: The issue is rarely about "good" versus



“bad” scopists. Instead, it’s about alignment, communication, and team building in an unregulated profession with wide variations in training, preferences, and expectations.

Drawing on years of experience working with court reporters and scopists across jurisdictions, Scoping International will explore why mismatches happen so frequently and how reporters can take ownership of building a reliable, effective scoping team. Attendees will learn why having support is not a luxury, but a strategic business decision, and how the right systems make delegation successful.

Key topics include:

Behind every legal record are not just words, but sworn testimony, meaning, context, and constitutional due process. While AI can simulate language patterns, it cannot assume accountability, provide certification, testify to authenticity, or preserve chain-of-custody integrity. That is why stenographic court reporters remain the gold standard.

This session uses light, grounded humor to illustrate a serious truth: AI can



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look impressive while fundamentally missing the point. From AI-generated toilet wallpaper that places furniture in trees and objects in mid-air, to self-driving cars that follow traffic rules straight into an active police standoff, we'll examine how machines recognize patterns without understanding context or consequence.

Grounded in federal and state law and NCRA's policy position that technology may supplement but never replace stenographic reporting, attendees will leave with a sharper vocabulary for defending the human-first standard – especially as AI tools become more visually convincing and socially persuasive.

On-site CART/Captioning Tech: It's Easier Than You Think

Fact: There are just not enough stenographers who are willing and/or able to provide in-person (IP) CART captioning. And we are turning down or referring requests at least once a week. This is a sector of the industry that is GROWING, despite advances in AI.

Most folks are either afraid of "writing naked," or they're intimidated by what they believe is complicated physical tech to make IP CART captioning possible. The truth is that you probably already have everything you need to perform the work; all you need is a few small pieces of equipment and some very simple training. This is applicable to both machine steno and voice writers.
