While I did not win, I am proud to say I did qualify in both legs of the national realtime test, and I will be practicing for next year's test in the months to come.

I know what you're thinking. Why would I put myself through such agony? I can honestly say it was a thrill to meet and compete with some of the most respected and preeminent writers in the United States. I challenged myself and was rewarded with the self-satisfaction of knowing I had taken the risk and done my best... and I also received .5 PDC points.
