

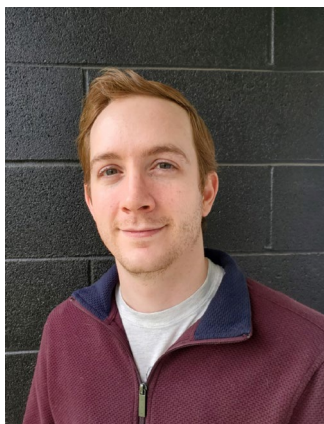

### **Local Court Reporting Student Awarded Scholarship** *Jordan Fair, from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, awarded a \$750 scholarship*

**RESTON, Va., July 25, 2022** — The National Court Reporters Association (NCRA), the country's leading organization representing stenographic court reporters, captioners, and legal videographers, has announced that Jordan Fair, from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, a student at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology in Alberta, Canada, has been awarded a \$750 [NCRA A to Z® Scholarship](#). The scholarships are supported by funds from the National Court Reporters Foundation (NCRF), the philanthropic arm of NCRA.

[NCRA's A to Z® Intro to Steno Machine Shorthand](#) program, a free online six-to-eight-week introductory course, lets participants see if a career in court reporting or captioning would be a good choice for them. The program is an introductory course in stenographic theory and provides participants with the opportunity to learn the basics of writing on a steno machine. There is no charge to take the course, but participants are required to have access to a steno machine or an iPad they can use to download an [iStenoPad app](#).

Fair, who is currently writing at 150 words per minute, expects to graduate in the summer of 2023 and is interested in pursuing a career in CART (Communications Access Realtime Translation) but is open to all possibilities.

"It is very encouraging to receive any scholarship; it motivates and fuels success. Not only will this scholarship help offset the cost of tuition, but it also helps motivate me to do my best," he said.

"I've known about court reporting since my teens. Probably from seeing it on TV and always having an interest in language, hand-eye coordination, and the legal system," Fair added. "To encourage others, I would say that court reporting is more varied than it first seems, it is not just courts. It's a fun career to explain to others. When I mention court reporting to people, they often want to know more and ask great follow-up questions."
