Local Court Reporting Student Awarded Scholarship Nicole Swanson, from Oyster Bay, N.Y., awarded a \$750 scholarship

RESTON, Va., July 6, 2022 — The National Court Reporters Association (NCRA), the country's leading organization representing stenographic court reporters, captioners, and legal videographers, has announced that Nicole Swanson, from Oyster Bay, N.Y., a student at Plaza College in Queens, N.Y., has been awarded a \$250 scholarship by the Association's Council on Approved Student Education (CASE).

Swanson, who is currently writing at 160 words per minute, anticipates graduating in the spring of 2023. She said she is interested in working both as an official and a freelance court reporter. She plans to use the scholarship money to purchase the study materials needed for NCRA's Registered Professional Reporter (RPR) certification exam so she can take the test once she finishes school.

"I majored in English and minored in legal studies, gaining my Paralegal Certificate from ABA Accredited Molloy College. I worked as a paralegal for three years with a law firm in Farmingdale, N.Y., while earning my degree. It was at the law firm where I came across court reporter's invoices and transcripts, and I decided that it was the career for me. I graduated from Molloy in December of 2019 and started the court reporting program at Plaza College in January 2020," she said.

She added that she would tell others interested in the profession that there are plenty of job opportunities with freelancing and captioning, and you have the option to create your own schedule.

"And of course, I would mention the high earning potential. I think it is also important to explain that while court reporting can be challenging to learn and master, you will eventually finish school and you will get out there and start working at your own pace and no one else's. This was a lesson I had to learn as a full-time worker and night student. Another perk is being a key member of the courtroom team during exciting testimony or captioning a live sports event. The possibilities are endless, and this career can really take you anywhere," Swanson said.

NCRA's A to Z[®] Intro to Steno Machine Shorthand program, a free online six-to-eight-week introductory course, lets participants see if a career in court reporting or captioning would be for them. The program is an introductory course in stenographic theory and provides participants with the opportunity to learn the basics of writing on a steno machine. There is no charge to take the course, but participants are required to have access to a steno machine or an iPad they can use to download the iStenoPad app.
