As a member of the U.S. Court Reporters Association, First currently serves on the Convention Committee and is a past member of the organization's Realtime Committee and earned first place honors in its 2012 annual Realtime Contest.

At the state level, First is a member of the Florida Court Reporters Association Government Relations and Courts committees and earned second place in that state's 2011 Speed and Realtime contests.

First also holds membership in the Ohio Court Reporters Association and has served on numerous committees as a presenter and is a numerous-time speed and realtime contest qualifier. She also organized numerous student and CART/captioning seminars. In 2006 she was presented with the OCRA Diplomat Award in recognition of her commitment to support the goals of the association. In 2008 the association also presented her with its Martin Fincun Award recognizing her diligence in promoting the profession.
