Local court reporter to serve national foundation Yolanda L. Walton from Norwalk, Ohio, to serve as National Court Reporters Foundation Trustee

RESTON, Va., July 30, 2025 — The National Court Reporters Foundation (NCRF), the philanthropic arm of the National Court Reporters Association (NCRA), announced that Yolanda L. Walton, FAPR, RPR, an official court reporter from Norwalk, Ohio, has been selected to serve a three-year term on its Board of Trustees. NCRA is the country's leading organization representing stenographic court reporters, captioners, and legal videographers. The announcement was made at a special awards luncheon held at the <u>2025 NCRA Conference & Expo</u> that took place July 24-26 in Minneapolis, Minn.

Walton is a 1986 graduate of Stark Technical College in North Canton, Ohio. She began her career as a freelance court reporter with Marie Fresch & Associates located in Norwalk, Ohio, and has worked as an official court reporter for Huron County Common Pleas Court since 1988. She holds the nationally recognized professional certification of Registered Professional Reporter (RPR) and is a member of the Fellow of the Academy of Professional Reporters (FAPR).

At the national level, Walton has served on numerous committees including the Midyear Planning, Official Community of Interest, Planning, Nominating, Brand Ambassador, and New Professional/Liaison Committees. She has also served as a national director and as a delegate for the National Congress of State Associations (NCSA). She is an annual contributor to NCRA's Political Action Committee fund, has been an NCRF Angel Donor since 2021, and is currently a member of the NCRF Angel Gather Committee.

At the state level, Walton holds membership in the Ohio Court Reporters Association (OCRA), where she has served in all executive roles including as President in 2007-2008. She has also

served on numerous committees including the Fundraising, Membership, Annual Convention Planning, Nominating, Grievance, and as the Past President Advisory/Consulting Group. She implemented OCRA's Annual Silent Auction fundraiser, created the Cardinal Reporter Recognition Award honoring reporters with 25 years of service, and served as a representative of the state association to the Ohio Judicial Conference in 2015-2016. In 2017 OCRA presented her with the Glenn W. Stiles Distinguished Service Award. She was also awarded OCRA's Martin Fincun Award and the Diplomat Award in 2002 and 1998, respectively.

Walton has presented at both the national and state level and has served on the advisory boards for the Stautzenberger College, with campuses in Maumee and Brecksville, and for the Miami Jacobs Career College. Throughout her career Walton has had court reporting students sit with her in the courtroom as part of their externships and has conducted informal Q&A sessions with students at local court reporting schools.

Court reporters and captioners rely on the latest in technology to use stenographic machines to capture the spoken word and translate it into written text in real time. These professionals work both in and out of the courtroom recording legal cases and depositions, providing live captioning of events, and assisting members of the deaf and hard-of-hearing communities with gaining access to information, entertainment, educational opportunities, and more.
