Local court reporting instructor to serve as National President-Elect Cathy Penniston, from Waukee, Iowa, named NCRA Vice President

RESTON, Va., July 28, 2025 — The National Court Reporters Association (NCRA), the country's leading organization representing stenographic court reporters, captioners, and legal videographers, has announced that Cathy Penniston, RPR, CRI, a court reporting instructor and broadcast captioner from Waukee, Iowa, will serve as its 2025-2026 President-Elect. Penniston holds the nationally recognized professional certifications of Registered Professional Reporter (RPR) and Certified Reporting Instructor (CRI). At the state level, Penniston served as president, vice president, and secretary of the Iowa Court Reporters Association, and is the recipient of the Roy Voelker Memorial Award for Distinguished Service for the court reporting profession of the state of Iowa. She also received the Indian Hills Community College Vision Award Alumni Entrepreneur of the Year in 2014.
