Local court reporter earns \$4,000 New Professional Reporter Grant Iris Thaller, RPR, from Mattoon, Ill., receives top honors

RESTON, Va., July 31, 2025 — The National Court Reporters Foundation (NCRF), the philanthropic arm of the National Court Reporters Association (NCRA), presented the New Professionals Reporter Grant in the amount of \$4,000 to Iris Thaller, RPR, from Mattoon, Ill. NCRA is the country's leading organization representing stenographic court reporters, captioners, and legal videographers. The announcement was made at a special awards luncheon at the 2025 NCRA Conference & Expo held July 24-26 in Minneapolis, Minn.

Thaller, who holds the nationally recognized professional certification of Registered Professional Reporter (RPR), works as an official court reporter.

"I'm deeply honored to be selected as the first-place recipient of the 2025 NCRF New Professionals Grant," she said. "I want to sincerely thank the National Court Reporters Foundation for this generous award. This motivates me even more as I begin my career, and I'm excited to grow and contribute to such an important and dynamic profession. I'm incredibly grateful for the support and excited to continue growing in this amazing career."

The New Professionals Grant spotlights rising talent in the court reporting and captioning professions. These annual awards recognize exceptional new professionals in court reporting and captioning who demonstrate dedication, skill, and promise in their early careers. NCRF awards the annual New Professional Reporter Grant to a reporter who is in his or her first yar of work, has graduated within a year from an NCRA-approved court reporting program, and meets specific criteria, including a grade point average of 3.5 or above, a letter of recommendation, an answer to an essay question, and is actively working in any of the career paths of judicial (official/freelance), CART, or captioning.

"This year's applicant pool was truly outstanding," said NCRF Chair Doug Friend, FAPR, RDR, CRR (Ret.), from Vancouver, Wash. "Each candidate brought strong qualifications to the table,

Now in its second year of expanding both the number of awards and the amounts given, the 2025 NCRF Grant program awarded \$4,000 each to two first-place recipients and \$2,000 each to two second-place recipients.
